## Know their stories!

Dear Friends of KAT,

Many of our friends and supporters have asked us for more details about the latest "treated dogs" that were featured in The KAT Updates II. Since then, more dogs have been rescued and are undergoing treatment at KAT. Some have dramatically recovered and will soon be ready for adoption.

### Pegleg puppy

This Puppy was brought into KAT after being found in this terrible condition. On examination, it was discovered that this little female puppy had rubber bands tied and embedded deeply into her upper leg causing this hideous painful swelling. Had KAT not rescued this puppy (notified by one of our supporters), she would have lost her leg due to gangrene.



This cheerful delightful little darling is now running about - well on the way to recovery. Though her wounded leg is a little larger than the other, this does not seem to bother her.

### Dumped by the owner



Sango is expected to stay at least two months

Sango, a beautiful male Tibetan Mastiff, was found by KAT after been abandoned by his owner. He suffered a severe fracture on one of his back legs. The fracture was late in being treated and was so severe that operation to pin the bone together was long and complicated. Because of lack of X-Ray and Orthopedic surgery facilities, KAT paid for a bone-pinning operation at a private clinic. Despite all the pain during treatment, Sango has been a mild and gentle dog and is recovering.

### Burnt BIG Dog

Dorje was found in the street with severe burns from having boiling water thrown over him. This gorgeous big placid male dog did not show any kind of aggression during his agonizing treatment (pics. below). In three weeks, he made a remarkable recovery and now it is back into the community.
